SYNOPSIS

It is Christmas Eve at the Stahlbaum home where everyone is celebrating with gifts and dancing. Clara's godfather, a toymaker, gives her a nutcracker that she treasures. Once the party is over, Clara sneaks downstairs to admire the Nutcracker. She falls asleep and begins to dream that her Nutcracker does battle with the Mouse King. After the battle, the Nutcracker turns into a handsome prince who takes Clara to the Land of Snowflakes and then onto the Land of Sweets.

Clara and the Prince are entertained by dancers who represent treats from several countries including Chocolate from Spain, Dolls from Russia, Tea from China, Coffee from Arabia, and Marzipan from France. To top it all, the Sugar Plum Fairy and her Cavalier honor Clara and her Prince with a beautiful Pas De Deux (dance of two).

THE NUTCRACKER PRINCE is Clara's toy that comes to life. He is transformed into a handsome Prince and accompanies Clara on her adventure.
